MEETING ROOMS AVAILABLE FOR USE BY COMMUNITY MEMBERS AND GROUPS

The renovated Municipal Building provides a great opportunity for community members and groups to meet in one of the various public meeting areas. If you're looking to meet with a friend or business associate in a public location, stop by the Municipal Building during regular office hours and utilize the causal seating in the building's lobby. The lobby seating also provides a great space, with large windows, to sit and work, or to just relax.

If it's a small group (10 or less), perhaps the conference room accessible from the lobby would meet your needs. The Conference Room, with a meeting table, chairs and whiteboard provides for some privacy by its location off the lobby and the ability to close the conference room door.





Finally, the Building's Meeting

Room can accommodate larger groups in various configurations. Because the seating is flexible, the Meeting Room can be set-up for formal presentations or small groups, with or without tables. The Meeting Room also features a sound system and video

presentation system that can be used with appropriate training from Township staff.

Access to these meeting areas is through the main lobby at the front of the building. The building configuration allows for the potential of all three areas at the same time with little interruption among the groups. Users from all these areas have access to the public restrooms located in the building's lobby. Internet access is available to all visitors to the Municipal Building through the use of the free guest Wi-Fi.

Be sure to stop by the Municipal Building to check out these meeting spaces.

North West EMS

Ambulances responding to emergencies are a highly visible reminder of how Northwest EMS serves this community. But we also provide educational programs to help keep you and your family safe.

Cribs for Kids is a program that teaches safe sleep practices to parents of infants. Soon-to-be parents in their last few months of pregnancy are welcome to contact Northwest EMS for information. The greatest risk of Sudden Infant Death is during the first year, and is highest in the second to fourth months of life. The program is done in the home so the educator can identify risks, dangers and needs. We can donate a crib, sheets and a sleep sack for the baby to families who take this educational program and have the need but not the finances to buy them. The cost of the program is covered by a state grant, and educational materials are provided by the Hershey Medical Center and Children's Miracle Network.



Concussion awareness is in the news with professional athletes being sidelined rather than risk brain injury. Northwest EMS has developed an educational program for youth sports leagues. School teams often have a team doctor provide the required PIAA concussion awareness training. Town clubs often do not have this resource. Our training can be presented at the team's location or in one of our EMS stations in Elizabethtown, Maytown or Manheim. We can provide CPR and first aid instruction for the coaches who need certification, and we can review their first aid kits and protocols. We also have a concussion awareness program for parents and athletes.

REDUCING RUNOFF

You Can Do Your Part by Creating Stormwater-Friendly Lawns, Gardens

When the amount of rain falling exceeds the land's ability to absorb it, the result is stormwater runoff.

Without treatment, stormwater that runs from the land into our waterways can be unhealthy for people and bad for the environment. Runoff can carry chemicals, metals, bacteria, viruses, organic compounds, and other pollutants directly into creeks, lakes, rivers, and streams. Runoff can also cause severe erosion and flooding—even during a typical Pennsylvania storm.

Clearly, then, what we do on the land impacts the quality of our water. Everyone plays a role in protecting this valuable resource by reducing runoff and the pollutants it carries.

This summer, homeowners can take steps to help with the effort by making sure their gardens and lawns are "stormwater-friendly."



The stormwater-friendly lawn

The following lawn-care steps will not only help to protect local streams and rivers but also result in cost savings for homeowners:

- Set your mower height to 3 inches or higher. Taller grass slows the runoff and produces a deeper and denser root system, which absorbs more water and prevents erosion. Deeper roots also reduce the need for watering during droughts and suppress weeds from growing up around them.
- Keep grass clippings and chopped leaves on your property. Lawn clippings decompose quickly, provide important nutrients for your lawn, and settle to create an organic layer on the soil that encourages stormwater infiltration. Using this mulch may also reduce or eliminate the need for nitrogen fertilizers.
- Figure out if you really need to fertilize your lawn. Foregoing fertilizer is ideal for the health of local waterways and ecosystems. However, if your lawn is thin or has bare spots, you may not have a choice since a dense, vegetated cover is the most stormwater-friendly lawn.

There are no one-size-fits all guidelines when it comes to fertilizer. Homeowners' needs vary drastically based on the soil texture and pH and nutrient levels. In fact, soil tests may reveal that your lawn is suffering from "micronutrient deficiency," a problem that standard chemical fertilizers may not alleviate. Identifying your lawn's needs first will reduce unnecessary applications, create a healthier lawn faster, and reduce your long-term costs.



• If fertilizer is needed, maximize the benefit of slow-release nitrogen and minimize the number of chemical applications. Slow-release nitrogen limits nutrient runoff. This type of fertilizer should be applied to your lawn in the spring, instead of the fall, to provide a steady source of nutrients throughout the growing season.

Another tip: Wait until the grass is actively growing to fertilize. Fertilizing during a lawn's dormant season increases the risk that the chemicals will run off into streams or leach into your water table because the root systems are less active.

• Do not fertilize or use pesticides within 15 to 20 feet of a stream. Keeping this distance will help keep chemicals out of waterways. Also, when you're done applying fertilizer, immediately sweep any granulated chemicals off hard surfaces and back onto your lawn. Your walkway, driveway, patio, or local road is often a quick route to the drainage pipes that discharge into local streams.

The stormwater-friendly garden

Home gardens can contribute considerable nutrients and other pollutants to waterways if not cared for responsibly. This mainly applies to fertilizers and pesticides.

Fertilizers: Instead of using chemical fertilizers, give organic alternatives, such as compost and manure, a try. Compost, a "do-ityourself" fertilizer that can be created from such things as vegetable scraps and garden clippings, contains the nutrients that help your vegetables grow.

Be sure to apply them directly to the ground before planting the vegetables to prevent runoff.

Pesticides: Many insects are harmless to people and play an important role in maintaining a healthy lawn or garden ecosystem. If one is posing a problem, however, identify the exact pest you have and research non-chemical alternatives to controlling it. Pesticides should be a last resort because they could infiltrate into groundwater, possibly contaminate drinking supplies, and hurt downstream ecosystems.

In the long run, little actions, such as taking a stormwater-friendly approach to your lawn and garden, will have a big impact as all of them work together to protect our water's quality.

Trash/Recycling pickup is Thursday. Place trash and recycling curbside on Wednesday night. Trash is limited to three 32-gallon trash cans/bags per week; no more than 30 pounds each. Additional cans or bags must have a yellow (\$1.00) tag on each one. Any can and/or

bag weighing more than 30 pounds, or oversized items (sofa, mattress, carpet, etc.) must have a red (\$3.00) tag attached. Bulk items too heavy to be lifted into the truck by two people will not be accepted. No construction debris will be collected. Tags can be purchased at the Township office during regular business hours.

Recycling is mandatory for everyone. No recycling is permitted in with the trash and no trash is permitted in the recycling bin. The following items are <u>currently</u> on the recycling list;

- Plastic #1 through #7 (soda/water bottles, milk jugs, etc.) Rinse thoroughly
- Glass food and beverage containers; rinse thoroughly
- Aluminum beverage and steel food and beverage containers; rinse thoroughly
- Paper, Paperboard, Cardboard (breakdown boxes as flat as possible); examples: clean pizza boxes, cereal boxes, tissue boxes, empty paper towel/toilet paper rolls, office paper, newspapers/inserts, magazines, catalogues/brochures, envelopes, junk mail, paper bags, phone books, soft cover books, clean paperboard food and drink cartons.

Do not put cardboard/paper products out if raining or very windy. Recycle plastic bags at the grocery store.

Mount Joy/East Donegal Township Compost Site is open to the residents of Mount Joy Borough and East Donegal Township. EDT residents may pick up a certificate at the Township building for use of the facility or use a copy of their trash bill. Only leaves and branches (maximum length 8ft; diameter 19 inches) will be accepted. The site will be open on the following dates and times:

Fridays from 3-6PM:

April 8 & 22 May 6 & 20 June 3 & 17 July 15 & 29 August 12 & 26 September 9 & 23 October 7 & 21 November 4 & 18

Saturdays from 9AM-12PM:

April 9 & 23 May 7 & 21 June 4 & 18 July 16 & 30 August 13 & 27 September 10 & 24 October 8 & 22 November 6 & 19

The Township is divided into two sections for yard waste pickup. *Yard waste (vegetation, grass clippings, leaves, small twigs, etc.) is to be placed in the Brown Kraft bags and tagged with a \$1.00 green yard waste tag and placed curbside the night before the designated pick-up date.* Poison ivy, obnoxious weeds and diseased plants should be placed in trash. Branches must be bundled, no more than 4 feet in length or 30 pounds.

What D⊕ y⊕ur Recyclables Bec⊛me?

Everyday materials like plastic, paper, aluminum and glass can be recycled into a variety of new items. By making the choice to recycle, you are giving these products new life. After recyclables are picked up at the curb, they are often sent to a Materials Recovery Facility (MRF), which is a specialized plant that receives, separates and prepares recyclable materials for marketing to end-user manufacturers. New products can be made from items in your recycling bin.

Plastics

These items are shredded and melted into pellets. Manufacturers use the different types of pellets to make new plastic products. For example, laundry detergent bottles might become buckets, toys or stadium seats. Milk or juice containers might end up as plastic lumber, outdoor play sets or new containers. Recycled soda and water bottles can be made into carpet, fleece and winter jacket insulation.





Paper and Cardboard

Paper and cardboard are separated by type then transported to a paper mill where the material is shredded and mixed into pulp to make new products. Newspaper might become an egg carton, paper plate or construction paper. Magazines are often turned into newspaper or paperboard packaging. Junk mail and office paper are processed into facial tissue. Recycled paperboard is made into new paperboard, paper towel rolls and paper backing for roof shingles. Cardboard boxes usually get a second life as paper bags or paperboard.

Aluminum and Tin Cans

Aluminum cans are often shredded and melted to make new cans or foil. Because there is no loss in quality when melting down aluminum, it is possible to recycle this material indefinitely. In order to recycle tin cans, processing plants separate the steel from the tin. Steel, which is also infinitely recyclable, can be used to make everything from bicycle and car parts to steel beams and rebar, household appliances or new cans.





Glass

Like aluminum and steel, glass can be recycled indefinitely and manufacturing glass into new bottles or jars uses fewer resources than starting from scratch. Glass is melted down in order to make new containers or crushed into small shards and used for making bricks, paved surfaces and sports turf.

Driving Safety Tips from Penn Waste

Working in the Waste and Recycling Collection field annually ranks as one of the deadliest jobs in America. Many of these fatal accidents can be prevented by simply engaging in a few safe driving techniques.

Slow Down: When approaching a truck, slow down and stop if necessary to allow the workers to complete their job.

Look for Workers: Workers are frequently getting on and off the truck. Look for workers before attempting to pass a truck.

Check for Traffic: be sure to check for traffic approaching from the opposite direction before proceeding around the truck.

Avoid Disractions: Avoid distractions such as eating, texting, changing the radio station or talking on your cell phone when maneuvering near a waste collection or recycling truck.

Stay Back at Least Two Car Lengths: Leave distance between you and the collection vehicle. Objects can drift out of the back of the truck and onto your vehicle while the truck is in operation if you are too close. The trucks sometimes need to move in reverse. Staying back from the truck will ensure that our drivers are able to see you to avoid any accidents.



Household Hazardous Waste

The following items are not permitted in the trash and are accepted (no fee for county residents) at the HHW facility: adhesives, automotive fluids such as motor oil, antifreeze, etc. (5 gallon containers-max), batteries, chemistry sets, cooking and frying oils, *covered devices (desk top computers, laptops, monitors, computer peripherals (keyboard, mouse, printer, and speakers), televisions, and e-readers, *E-waste photo cameras, video cameras, cell phones and smart phones, cell phone peripherals (chargers, batteries, Bluetooth earpiece, air cards, clips, cases), DVD and VCR players, MP3 players and iPods, PDA's, portable electronic game players, video and game consoles, stereos and stereo peripherals (CD players, turntables, amplifiers, speakers) NO wooden speakers. Limit of 10 e-waste items per customer per day, fire extinguishers, floor and furniture polish, Fuel: kerosene, gasoline, propane, household cleaners, lawn treatments: herbicides, pesticides, Mercury containing items (ballasts, fluorescent bulbs, thermostats and thermometers), paint, rust inhibitors, stains, turpentine and thinners, Photographic and pool chemicals.
