PLEASE NOTE THE FOLLOWING:

- The recommended date and time for Trick or Treat is done for the safety of those participating and does not prohibit or prevent residents from conducting Trick or Treat activities on other dates or times.
- This recommended date and time will not be changed, altered, or be cancelled, for any reason.
- Participation in Trick or Treat is voluntary and as such participants should make decisions based on their personal comfort level after considering all factors, including the possibility of inclement weather and COVID-19.
- The Township does not enforce compliance with COVID-19 guidelines and will not as they relate to trick or treat events.

Parents can help make sure this Halloween will be a safe one by following these tips:

• Costumes should be bright and reflective and not drag on the ground; masks should allow for unobstructed vision and kid's shoes should fit their feet.

- Make sure young children are accompanied by an adult, even if it's not you.
- Pack a flashlight in the candy bag for use while walking after dark.
- Stay away from houses that are dark.
- If there is no sidewalk, walk on the left side of the road, facing traffic using the flashlight for safety.
- A cell phone should be handy to call 911 in case of emergency.
- Inspect all candy. Although tampering is rare, it's better to be safe than sorry.
- As a homeowner, it is your duty to make sure the yard is clear of anything that could be a tripping hazard (i.e. hoses, ladders, flower pots, dog toys, unlit steps).
- Jack O'Lanterns should be lit by battery-powered flame, not a candle, to prevent a costume, bag, or decoration from catching fire.
- Lock your dog or cats up in a room where they can't see the trick-or-treaters. And don't forget, chocolate can be deadly to pets. Make sure kids don't try to feed your family pet a treat!

THE RULES ABOUT CHICKENS

East Donegal Township's zoning regulations spells out the basics of backyard poultry ownership in the Township.

The keeping of no more than six (6) total chickens

(and similar fowl, not including guinea fowl), is permitted by right under the following conditions:

Permitted on lots utilized for single-family detached dwellings with a minimum lot size of 7,500 square feet.
Such use is for the pleasure of the residents of the property and not a commercial activity. No retail sales permitted.


▷ Coops or other structures must be setback a minimum of ten (10) feet from any rear or side property line, and not permitted within any front yard.

➤ The keeping of fowl must be fully contained within the property.

▹ No roosters are permitted.

► The keeping of fowl must comply with any PA Department of Agricultural rules and directives.

Please contact the Township Zoning Officer with any questions regarding these requirements.

This event will be free of charge to all residents living in East Donegal Township, Mount Joy Township, and West Donegal Township. The amount of material to be shredded will be limited to four boxes or bags of paper per property.

Those participating in this event are asked to bring donations of canned and boxed food items (monetary donations also accepted) to be given to the local food bank. Please no perishable items. Donations should be non-expired, non-breakable, and all items should be in unopened containers. Glass, frozen food, fresh produce/meats or home-made food cannot be accepted. Your help is appreciated by those in need in our community.

The Susquehanna Regional Police Department has a permanent "prescription medication drop box" at the Police Department for citizens to safely dispose of expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs. The drop-box is anonymous; no

questions or requests for identification will be made by law enforcement personnel. Residents should remove their personal information from containers before depositing them in the Take Back Box. Bring your expired, unused, or unwanted medication to the East Donegal Township Municipal Building (190 Rock Point Road) for proper disposal. Drugs must be in a container such as a pill bottle, box, blister pack, or zip lock bag. Leave liquid medications in their original containers. No needles, aerosols, or biohazard materials may be deposited. Do not put medical equipment, batteries, syringes, or other biohazard waste into the drop-off boxes.

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

APPLIANCE/TIRE PICKUP SATURDAY, OCT. 16, 2021

Tags for the appliances and tires are purchased at the Township Office. Appliances (washers, dryers, stoves, dish washers, freezers, refrigerators, dehumidifiers, air-conditioners, hot water heaters, etc.) are \$12.00 each. Tire tags are \$2.00 each. Rims are \$2.00 each. When purchasing a tag, you will need to give your street address and identify the item you are putting out for pickup. Appliances/ tires must be out the night before the pickup date.

TRASH SCHEDULE

Tuesday trash day- all roads west of Colebrook Road and Old Colebrook Road Wednesday trash day — all roads east of Colebrook Road including Colebrook & Old Colebrook Roads.

Occasionally the trash will be delayed a day or cancelled until the following week. If the trash is to be picked up the following week double the amount of normal trash may be put out for pickup. Anyone signed up to receive Township e-mails will be notified by e-mail of any changes.

LET'S TALK ABOUT ZONING

Different Uses Require Different Approvals In each zoning district, only specific uses are permitted. Each new use, modification, alteration or change of an existing use requires an approval by the Township. This insures compatible uses through compliance with the Township Zoning Ordinance and helps to avoid future enforcement actions.

There are three different ways that a use can be permitted.

First, most common uses are permitted by "by right", and can be accomplished though a simple application form and approved by the Zoning Officer.

More intense uses and those with a potentially greater impact on a neighborhood or the community at large are permitted as "special exception" or "conditional uses". These types of uses go through a public meeting that allows public comment. The Zoning Hearing Board or Board of Supervisors can carefully review the application to make sure that it meets the goals and objectives of the community and Township ordinances.

A "special exception" or "conditional uses" are still permitted uses. The applicant must prove that all of the specific criteria associated with a specific type of use as prescribed in the Zoning Ordinance are met.

Nonconformities

Zoning regulates the uses of land and structures. Generally, an existing use that was legal when it was first established can continue to operate regardless of any changes in zoning regulations. An existing use or structure that would not be permitted under current zoning regulations is known as a "nonconforming use" or "nonconforming structure". Nonconforming uses can: a) be sold to a new owner or operator, b) be expanded within certain limits and c) be changed to a different nonconforming use, as long as the new use is not more intense than the old use.

Variances – What Are They and How Do They Apply To Me?

Variances are the process by which a property owner who finds that, due to some unique physical condition of the property, they cannot meet all of the requirements of the Zoning Ordinance in order to undertake a needed project. If there does exist a unique physical condition of the property, this would be considered a "hardship", and the property owner may apply for a variance to be granted by the Township Zoning Hearing Board.

PROJECTS REQUIRE FINAL INSPECTION

As our busiest season of the year ends, we would like to give everyone a reminder to close out any open permits. Once a project is started, periodical inspections are conducted to verify compliance with the Codes and Ordinances. One of the required inspections is called a "final" inspection. It is the "final" inspection that is most often missed. A final inspection is important to ensure the work has been completed to code and meets all requirements. It could also point out some items you or your contractor might not have known to address and ensure the safety of the home improvement. Please contact the office to schedule the final zoning inspection. Have your permit number ready when you call. The final inspection is included in the amount you paid for your permit. So don't wait - call in for that final inspection!

RAIN GARDEN MAINTENANCE:

What You Need to Know About Rain Gardens and How to Maintain Them.

What is a Rain Garden?

A rain garden is a method of treating stormwater by capturing and allowing filtering and settling of sediment and pollutants through plantings and a mulch layer. The root systems of plants enhance infiltration and improve water quality prior to infiltration. See the graphic below of a typical rain garden.

What Can I Use a Rain Garden For?


- 1. Reducing runoff volume in your yard.
- 2. Filtering pollutants
- 3. Recharging the groundwater by helping water to infiltrate.
- 4. Improve aesthetics and provide a bird or butterfly habitat.
- 5. Meeting a stormwater management requirement when obtaining a municipal permit for a building, shed, or driveway addition.

How do I Maintain my Rain Garden?


- Weed your rain garden regularly.
- Ensure that your rain garden is not collecting leaf, branch, or sedimented debris. If it is clean and dispose of any debris properly.
- Ensure that mulch is reapplied as needed or at a minimum once a year. Mulch does not need to be reapplied in a thick layer. 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " is enough.
- Trim plantings on an as needed basis. This can be done 1-2 times a year or as needed.
- Replace dead or dying plants as needed.

Carbon Monoxide – "The Silent Killer"



There are numerous potential sources of carbon monoxide in your home. Furnaces, water heaters, clothes dryers, space heaters, ranges, ovens, fireplaces, wood stoves, charcoal grills and automobiles all produce carbon monoxide. When not properly monitored each of these items could become a lethal weapon. Carbon monoxide is the leading cause of fatal poisonings in North America. Exposure to high concentrations can cause death in just a few minutes. Carbon monoxide is often referred to as the "Silent Killer" because it is colorless, odorless and tasteless, making it almost impossible to detect. The symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning can be very vague, and often involve many of the body's systems. But immediate diagnosis is critical. Source: The Fire Marshal's Public Fire Safety Council

Exposure to CO can cause flu-like symptoms such as headaches, nausea, dizziness, burning eyes, confusion, drowsiness and even loss of consciousness. In very severe cases, CO poisoning can cause death. Older people, people with heart or breathing problems, children and pets may experience the effects earlier than others. At any time, if you or anyone else in your home is experiencing the symptoms of CO poisoning, get everyone out of the house and seek medical help. Call 911 or your local fire department.

GEARS TO OFFER RECREATION PROGRAMS IN EAST DONEGAL TOWNSHIP



Before we know it, winter will be upon us. Winter brings the potential for snow; homeowners can assist the Public Works Department to provide

an improved level of service by observing the following guidelines:

• Do not park vehicles on the street until the street has been completely cleared off. Note that the Township, in most cases, will plow the street two separate times. The first time will be to clear an access to the primary roads, and the second pass will push the snow back to the edge of the street.

WINTER MAINTENANCE

- Wait until the street is plowed before clearing driveway openings.
- Never shovel snow out into the streets.
- Shovel out fire hydrants if they are located on your property.
- Motorists should be aware of Township vehicles salting or plowing snow. Motorists should not interfere or impede the plow in any way.
- Remove the snow or ice from your sidewalk within 24 hours after the cessation of any fall of snow, sleet, or freezing rain.
- Make sure mailboxes are properly secure.
- Do not try to pass a snow plow. As stated above, observing these guidelines

will assist in providing our residents with the highest level of service.



PENNSYLVANIA'S SCHOOL BUS STOPPING LAW

- When you meet or overtake a stopped school bus with red signal lights flashing and stop arm extended, you MUST STOP.
- When you approach an intersection where a school bus is stopped with red signal lights flashing and stop arm extended, you MUST STOP.
- You MUST STOP at least ten (10) feet away from the school bus.
- You **MUST WAIT** until the red lights have stopped flashing and the stop arm has been withdrawn before moving.
- DO NOT MOVE until all the children have reached a place of safety.

KNOW YOUR RESPONSIBILITIES

- ♦ 1.5 million children are transported on Pennsylvania roads each day.
- + These children are transported approximately 400 million miles to school each year.
- + To further promote safety, school vehicles may be equipped with a yellow flashing or revolving light.
- + Every year, children are needlessly injured or killed by drivers passing stopped school buses.



You MUST STOP on roadways with painted lines.



You MUST STOP at an intersection, whether it is or is not marked with a stop sign. All traffic MUST stop.



You MUST STOP on roadways with ridged/grooved dividers.

following the recommendation of the Township Board of Supervisors. Paul replaces Scott Kingsboro who served as Coordinator for the past 15 years. Paul graduated from Donegal High School Class of 1994, then went on to join the United States Air Force. He grew up around the Florin Fire Company with his late mother Brenda Karper (Castline), who had been a long-time auxiliary member. Paul joined the Florin Fire Company at the age of 14, and now has over 30 years' experience in the emergency services. Though out the years has been a member of several fire departments and is currently a member of the Maytown East Donegal Township Fire Department, and life member with the Lancaster Township Fire Department. Paul was an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) for over 15 years. He was a 911 Emergency Dispatcher for 2 years, followed by his now full-time career as a Pennsylvania State Constable and K9 officer with his partner "Sarge". Paul also previously worked for Command School Inc. where he held the position of Conference Coordinator, as well as an assistant instructor teaching the Incident Command System and National Incident Management System.

Paul is the owner of two successful businesses, East Donegal Constable LLC which provides law enforcement officers for private entities/events, and EDC Medical Services LLC. providing basic first aid services for events and businesses. He has 4 beautiful daughters ages 19, 16, and twins age 5. After getting married to his wife Faith Castline in 2014, they built a home in Maytown, and have become permanent familiar fixtures around the area.

LEARN THE SOUNDS OF FIRE SAFETY

The Maytown East Donegal Township Fire Department is teaming up with the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA)—the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week for more than 90 years—to promote this year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, "Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety" This year's campaign, October 3-9th, works to educate everyone about simple but important actions they can take to keep themselves and those around them safe.

The Maytown East Donegal Township Fire Department encourages all residents to embrace the 2021 Fire Prevention Week theme.

It's important to learn the different sounds of smoke and carbon monoxide alarms. When an alarm makes noise—a beeping sound or a chirping sound—you must take action! Make sure everyone in the home understands the sounds of the alarms and knows how to respond, knowing the difference can save you, your home, and your family. To learn the sounds of your specific smoke and carbon monoxide alarms, check the manufacturer's instructions that came in the box, or search the brand and model online.

The Maytown East Donegal Township Fire Department wants to share safety tips to help you "Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety"

- A continuous set of three loud beeps beep, beep, beep—means smoke or fire. Get out, call 9-1-1, and stay out.
- A single chirp every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be changed.
- All smoke alarms must be replaced after 10 years.
- Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.
- Make sure your smoke and CO alarms meet the needs of all your family members, including those with sensory or physical disabilities.

SIMPLE WAYS TO CREATE A BETTER COMMUNITY

East Donegal Township is a great community; all great communities consist of many great neighborhoods. It is important that we continue to practice neighborly courtesy in each of our neighborhoods, such as:

- Maintaining or cutting lawns (grass/weeds need to be below 8").
 Branches that extend over a sidewalk must be trimmed to a height of 8' above grade, and to a height of 14' over a roadway.
- Refraining from dumping yard waste on someone else's property, or open burning of this material.
- Keeping dogs leashed and cleaning up after them.
- Keeping yards free of trash, unused furniture, building materials, etc.
- Securing the necessary permits for accessory buildings and fences.

- Repairing cracked or heaving sidewalks; these obstructions create a hazard for pedestrians. Also, removing any weeds & grass within the cracks of the sidewalk and along curb line.
- Being respectful to your neighbors by keeping loud noise to a minimum.
- Not parking of any recreational vehicle, boat (with or without a trailer), camper, trailer or commercial vehicle on any Township Street.
- Not parking vehicles in front of mailboxes limiting mail delivery.
