SPLAIN & LOUCKS TO HEAD SUSQUEHANNA REGIONAL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY

Over the past several months talks began with the townships of East Donegal & Conoy with the main emphasis on the need to for an active and functioning emergency management agency (EMA), as this is a Pennsylvania State law stating that every municipality must have a local (EMA). After many talks both townships posted the volunteer position for an emergency management coordinator (EMC), after letters of interest were taken an interview panel was established from both East Donegal & Conoy townships and after candidate's were interviewed Frank A. Splain, Jr, was selected to head the newly established inter-municipal (EMA) now known as the Susquehanna Regional Emergency Management Agency (SREMA). Splain a 1980 graduate of the Donegal High School and a lifelong resident of Maytown, began

his career at the age of 16 with both the Maytown-East Donegal Township Fire Department and the Maytown-East Donegal Twp Ambulance Association, over the years he held many operational positions in the fire department right up the top position of fire chief. While running with the Maytown Ambulance held there as well many operational positions with up to the operations chief of the service. With 48+ years in the emergency services, Splain currently holds his active nationally registered emergency medical technician (EMT) certification, and he holds his national fire pro-board certifications as a firefighter 2, along with many other fire/ems creditials.

Loucks was appointed by Splain to serve as the deputy emergency management coordinator, Paul M. Loucks served over 50+ years with the Bainbridge Fire Company and also with the Bainbridge Ambulance Association, Loucks held many both administrative and operations positions with the fire company right up to the top position as well as the fire chief. Running with the Bainbridge Ambulance Loucks was a certified emergency medical technician.

On July 3rd, 2025 the East Donegal Township board of supervisors approved the intermunicipal resolution with Conoy Township as well as appointed Frank A. Splain, Jr as the emergency management coordinator. On July 10th the Conoy township board of supervisors approved the inter-municipal resolution as well as appointed Frank A. Splain Jr, as the emergency management coordinator thus officially forming the Susquehanna Regional Emergency Management Agency (SREMA).

Emergency Management Agency or "agency" means the agency created under this Article for the preparation for and the carrying out of all emergency functions, other than functions for which military forces are primarily responsible, in order to minimize and repair injury and damage resulting from disasters or catastrophes caused by either natural or man-made causes. The local EMA is a very integral part of any critical emergency affects the quality of life and well-being in our communities.

Pennsylvania's Emergency Management Services Code (35 Pa. C.S. §§ 7101 et seq.) directs and authorizes every political subdivision (i.e., county, city, borough, incorporated town, and township) to have an emergency management program that includes a trained Emergency Management Coordinator (EMC), an Emergency Operations Plan (EOP), and a functioning Emergency Operations Center (EOC) with a trained staff.

Baby wipes and adult wipes are not biodegradable, even if the phrase "flushable" or "safe to flush" is on the package. These "un-flushable" and many "flushable" wipes do not fall apart in water like toilet paper. The wipes get tangled in the sewage with other wipes and debris, resulting in sewer clogs and expensive repairs to both the resident and the collection system/Treatment Plant. Just a few of the things that should stay out of the sewer system are baby/adult wipes, paper towels, feminine products, Q-tips, bandages, dental Floss, wash cloths, socks, sanitary & incontinent products, rags, kitty litter, cigarette butts, medicines. When kid's toys get flushed, they too cause problems in the sewer system and an extra expense which everyone will pay to repair.

APPLIANCE/TIRE PICKUP OCTOBER 27/28, 2025 ON YOUR TRASH DAY APRIL 27/28, 2026 ON YOUR TRASH DAY

Tags for appliances and tires are purchased at the

Township Office. Appliances (washers, dryers, stoves, dishwashers, freezers, refrigerators, dehumidifiers, air-conditioners, hot water heaters, etc.) are \$15.00 each. Tire tags are \$4.00 each. Rims are \$4.00 each. When purchasing a tag, you will need to give your street address and identify the item you are putting out for pickup. Appliances/tires must be out the night before the designated pickup date.

Trash/Recycling:

Place trash & recycling curbside the night before your pickup day. Place trash/recycling where is easily visible for pick up. Trash is limited to three bags.

Each bag maximum 32 gallon; weighing 30 lbs. or less.

Additional bags must be tagged as extra trash (\$1.00) each.

Bags over 30lbs. must have bulk item tag (\$5.00) each.

Larger items must have bulk item tag (\$5.00) each. Call to find out if it is acceptable.

Appliance (\$15.00) / Tire (\$4.00) / Rims (\$4.00) pick up is twice a year. Yard waste is to be in the brown bags with green tags (\$2.00) each on specific dates.

No Construction debris is permitted in trash.

No yard waste is permitted in trash during yard waste season.

No burning of trash or yard waste is permitted at any time.

Tags for extra trash, bulk items, tires, appliances, yard waste are purchased at the Township building.

Occasionally the trash will be delayed a day or cancelled until the following week. If the trash is to be picked up the following week,

double the amount of normal trash may be put out for pick up. Anyone signed up to receive Township e-mails will be notified by e-mail of any changes.


*Notes on Recycling:

There is a dumpster for corrugated cardboard located at the Township Building. If your corrugated cardboard does not fit into your bin take it to the cardboard dumpster.

- * Recycling is mandatory for everyone in the Township including all farms and businesses.
- * If it isn't on the list do NOT put it in the bin.
- * Do not put cardboard out if it is raining or windy.
- * Do not put plastic bags in the recycling bin for any reason. Recycle plastic bags at the grocery store.
- * Do not put recycling out on windy days.
- * If your trash or recycling is missed call the office 717-426-3167. If you are calling after hours leave a message. If your trash was not out when the trucks went by it is NOT considered missed.

MEALS ON WHEELS

Mount Joy, Marietta and Maytown residents can receive meals on wheels. A hot and cold meal will be delivered Mondays through Fridays to your home for a fee. You can choose if you want every day or just selected days. The meals arrive around 8:30 a.m. Clients are billed monthly for the meals received. There are no dietary restrictions. If you are interested call 717-653-5493 extension 226 and leave a message with your name and phone number. A scheduler will give you a call back. The local Meals on Wheels works with Lancaster County Office of the Aging.

Trick or Treat night will be held on Friday, October 31st; 6pm – 8pm.



The recommended date and time for Trick or Treat is done for the safety of those participating and does not prohibit or prevent residents from conducting Trick or Treat activities on other dates or times. This recommended date and time will not be changed, altered, or cancelled, for any reason. Participation in Trick or Treat is voluntary and as such participants should make decisions based on their personal comfort level, including the possibility of inclement weather.



Ambulance Billing: How Does It Work?

What happens when you call 911 and you are treated and/or transported by an ambulance crew? This is a question that is received often by the Municipal Emergency Services Authority of Lancaster County (MESA).

After MESA responds to a 911 call and evaluates, treats and/or transports a patient, there are three key factors that determine if or what the patient is charged for ambulance services including:


- Whether or not the patient has health insurance
- Whether or not MESA has the patient's insurance information
- Whether or not MESA's annual fee has been paid

Here's a detailed breakdown of the ambulance billing process:

- If you are evaluated, treated or transported and *do not* have insurance, but have paid your annual MESA fee, you will be billed 50% of the charge. If your annual MESA fee is not paid, you will be billed the full amount of the charge.
- If you are evaluated, treated or transported and *do* have insurance, MESA will bill your insurance *if* MESA has your insurance information. If MESA does not have your insurance information, you may receive a statement requesting your insurance information. Once your insurance information is obtained, MESA will then bill your insurance.
- If you have insurance and have paid your annual MESA fee:
 - o If your insurance pays MESA, you will receive no residual bill.
 - If your insurance pays you, you must submit payment for that amount to MESA.
 - o If your insurance allowance is applied to your deductible, MESA will bill you 50% of the charge.
- If you have insurance and have not paid your annual MESA fee:
 - If your insurance pays MESA, MESA will bill you the remaining balance.
 - o If your insurance pays you, you must submit payment for the full amount to MESA.
 - o If your insurance pays nothing, MESA will bill you the full amount.

Even with this explanation, we recognize that this process is not necessarily easy to follow! That is why you can also find a visual chart that details this process on MESA's website at mesalancasterpa.gov/ems-services/.

MESA staff are available to answer any questions you have about your bill. MESA representatives are available Monday through Friday, 9 am to 4 pm, at 717-361-8220 (select option #5).



LITHIUM-ION BATTERIES IN YOUR HOME

LITHIUM-ION BATTERIES store a lot of energy in a small place. These batteries can overheat, start a fire, or explode if overcharged or damaged. By learning how to **BUY**, **CHARGE**, and **RECYCLE** these batteries safely, you can help prevent a fire in your home.

BUY only listed products. When buying a product that uses a lithium-ion battery look for a safety certification mark such as UL, ETL, or CSA. This means it meets important safety standards.

CHARGE devices safely. Always use the cables that came with the product to charge. Follow the instructions from the manufacturer.

Buy new chargers from the manufacturer or one the manufacturer has approved.

CHARGE your device on a hard surface. Do NOT overcharge your device. Unplug it or remove the battery when it is fully charged.

STOP using the device right away if the battery smells weird, gets too hot, makes popping noises, changes shape or color. If it is safe, move the device away from anything that can catch fire. Call **9-1-1.**

RECYCLE batteries responsibly. Don't throw lithium-ion batteries in the trash or regular recycling bins. They could start a fire.

RECYCLE your device or battery at a safe battery recycling location. Visit **call2recycle.org** to find a recycling center near you. Check with Lowes, Home Depot, Direct Tools Factory Outlet and Staples to see if they recycle batteries.

Call2Recycle's number one priority remains its call 2 Recycle commitment to safety. If you have any Damaged, Home Page Defective or Recalled (DDR) batteries (including lithiumion), please DO NOT bring them to a participating collection site. DDR batteries require special handling and CANNOT be placed in regular Call2Recycle boxes.

WHAT GOES IN THE BIN?

- 1. Corrugated Cardboard
 - a. Packing & shipping boxes with fluted sheet. (must be dry)
- 2. Plastic Bottles & Jugs
 - a. Only plastic with a neck.
- 3. Metal Food & Beverage Cans
 - a. Food & beverage cans (aluminum, steel, tin).
- 4. Glass Food & Beverage Bottles & Jars
 - a. Clear, green & brown glass bottles & jars.

Tips to Recycle Right

- Remove lids & discard them
- **No** plastic bags in the bin (recycle at the store)
- Items must be empty & rinsed out
- No other materials than listed are to be put in the bin
- Flatten cardboard (no grease or food on boxes)

Do not put oil containers or containers that held poisons such as herbicides or insecticides in the bin. WHEN IN DOUBT, THROW IT OUT!

Park Pavilions

Park pavilions are rented through the Township. You must fill out an application form and pay a non-refundable rental fee. When a pavilion is rented it is for the exclusive use of the person or group renting it. Check the list posted at the pavilion to see if it is available for use.

HOW LITTER IMPACTS THE ENVIRONMENT

Litter has devastating effects on ecosystems, public health, and communities. Here's how:

1. Pollution of Land, Water, and Air

When litter breaks down, it releases harmful chemicals and microplastics. For example, polystyrene breaks into tiny pieces that pollute soil and waterways, disrupting natural habitats and food chains. This pollution threatens drinking water sources and the aquatic ecosystems that millions depend on. Microplastics have been found in fish and shellfish consumed by humans, raising concerns about long-term health impacts. In addition, litter contributes to air pollution. Researchers estimate that more than 40% of the world's litter is burned in open air, releasing toxic emissions. These emissions include greenhouse gases and particulates, which worsen climate change and contribute to respiratory and cardiovascular diseases.

2. Wildlife Endangerment

Animals often mistake litter for food, leading to ingestion and fatal consequences. Marine and terrestrial species are at risk, with over 100,000 marine animals dying annually due to plastic litter. Wildlife such as ducks, geese, and fish are frequently harmed by discarded fishing lines, six-pack rings, and Styrofoam debris. Entanglement in litter can cause suffocation, drowning, or restricted movement, while ingestion can result in internal injuries or starvation. Protecting wildlife begins with reducing the prevalence of litter in natural habitats.

3. Health Risks

Littered areas attract pests, such as rodents and insects, which can carry diseases and parasites. These pests thrive in trash-strewn environments, increasing the risk of disease transmission to humans. For instance, improperly discarded food waste can lead to outbreaks of food borne illnesses, while sharp objects like broken glass or rusted metal pose physical hazards to both humans and animals. Preventing litter can significantly improve public health outcomes and reduce the burden on healthcare systems.

4. Economic Costs

Litter cleanup costs in the United States total billions annually, straining municipal budgets and diverting funds from other critical areas like education, infrastructure, and healthcare. Businesses also bear financial burdens, as litter reduces property values, deters customers, and damages local tourism. For example, studies show that clean, well-maintained areas attract more visitors and residents, emphasizing the importance of maintaining litter-free spaces.

Reducing litter requires collective action and innovative solutions. Here are ways to help:





- There are only four categories of items to be in the recycling bin.
 Read the list.
- No person shall park a vehicle on the left-hand side of any twoway street at any time which would result in the vehicle facing in the wrong direction against oncoming traffic.
- No person shall park a vehicle in a posted bus stop zone at any time.
- No person shall park a vehicle within 15 feet of any mailbox.
- No person shall park a recreational vehicle, motor home, house trailer, camper, or trailer designed or used to haul motorized recreational equipment such as a boat, motorcycle, snowmobile or jet ski on any road, street, highway or right-of-way in the Township.
- No person shall park a commercial motor vehicle used to transport goods or passengers for the profit of an individual or business, with a gross vehicle weight in excess of five tons on any road, street, highway or right-of-way in the Township.
- No vehicle shall be parked in any manner so as to impede or prohibit the passage of emergency vehicles.
- Reminder: Do NOT try to pass a snowplow.



When shoveling snow this winter please keep in mind that you may not put the snow from your driveway or sidewalk onto the road. If cars are parked along the roadside the plows might not be able to get through your road. When they do get through it is inevitable that there will be snow from the road that ends up on driveways. Wet heavy snow increases the chance of damage to mailboxes. Residents are reminded that damage occurring from plowed snow is the property owner's responsibility. Cars should not be parked in cul-de-sacs or on narrow streets until after the road has been plowed. If there is a fire hydrant on your property it should be cleared off for safety reasons. Snow should be cleared from sidewalks within 24 hours after the end of snow fall, sleet or freezing rain. Estimated plow routes are as follows: Main roads first followed by secondary streets, then developments. Alleys (single lane roads or streets) will be last.

Please check the Township website for road closures during weather emergencies.
